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MY PERSPECTIVE



"Inwardly we are being renewed day by day"

The brevity of life

"All people are like grass, and all their glory is like the flowers of the field; the grass withers and the flowers fall, but the word of the Lord endures for ever." So wrote Isaiah (40:6-8), and quoted by Peter (1 Peter 1:24-25). What is the point? In a nutshell it is this: life is brief.

As I get older this comes home to me more and more. I remember Albert Winstanley often saying to me that in his mind he felt he was still a young man but his body told him he no longer was that young. And then he would quote this scripture: *"Though outwardly we are wasting away, yet inwardly we are being renewed day by day"* (2 Corinthians 4:16). I am learning more and more what Albert meant.

These past few months have seen many Christians throughout the country leave this life and go on to their reward. It is sad for us who are left behind in that we no longer can talk with them and be taught and encouraged by them. However we are not sad for them: this is what we are living for as God's children. This is the day we truly are freed from this life and can go home. I read somewhere that the Christians in the first few centuries didn't mark birthdays but the day of someone's death. The reason was they could celebrate that they had now gone home.

I am discovering as we get older that there are more and more funerals to attend. Perhaps this is due to knowing more people as we get older or maybe it's simply the generation before us reaching their allotted time, and we need to realise it won't be long before our generation (whatever than happens to be) will be the next to reach the end of the line. We do mourn the loss when someone has left this life, especially if they have been close to us. But our mourning is different from those who aren't Christians. As Paul wrote, "If only for this life we have hope in Christ, we are of all people most to be pitied" (1 Corinthians 15:19). Yet that is how most people around us live: get what you can now because they think this is all there is. Yet there is so much more! Some even reject becoming a Christian because, they say, what if there is nothing after this? They think that they would have missed out in this life if they followed Jesus and it wasn't real. How sad!

Death is, of course, part of life. Despite continual research in working out how to live longer death will come to us all, so our emphasis in this life must be to get ready for the next – because the end could come at any time. Jesus came to let us know that there is something better waiting for us. After all, he conquered death! "'Death has been swallowed up in victory.' 'Where, O death, is your victory? Where, O death, is your sting?'... But thanks be to God! He gives us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ" (1 Corinthians 15:54-55,57). Because Jesus came back from the dead we know there is something awaiting us after death.

So, how should we live? Notice how Paul concluded his discussion to the Christians in Corinth: "Therefore, my dear brothers and sisters, stand firm. Let nothing move you. Always give yourselves fully to the work of the Lord, because you know that your labour in the Lord is not in vain" (1 Corinthians 15:58). As we often say, we need to "keep on keeping on", remembering that we are living for eternity.

REFRESH, RESET, REIGNITE – FURTHER THOUGHTS

In July this year, at the invitation of the Kirkcaldy elders, a group met at Balmule House to 'Refresh, Reset, and Reignite' (see August 2023 Christian Worker for a full report). The discussions at the retreat led by a team from Nolen Hills church of Christ centred around 'Evangelism - An Ancient Method in a New Time'. It became apparent during the various sessions that some things needed to change if we were to move forward. So, as we left to go back to our home congregations and consider what congregations needs to go forward, we agreed to meet for a follow-up and share our reflections on what was discussed, and what we had or planned to implement.

Of course, each congregation has its own needs, but here are some general thoughts:

- 1. We must make an honest appraisal. Ask. Do we need a reset? Do we need a *radical* reset?
- 2. We must be willing to change where appropriate. Insanity has been defined as, *"Keeping doing the same things over and over and expecting a different result or outcome."* It would be foolish to be asking God to make changes while still doing the same things!
- 3. We must trust in the power of God.
- 4. We must believe that he empowers us.
- 5. We must have bold and focused leadership with a vision that breathes new life into the congregation.
- 6. We must all capture that renewed vision.
- 7. We must appreciate that a radical reset of a congregation won't always be easy – change can be difficult. There may be resistance. Some may be happy with the status quo – happy where they are.
- 8. We need to be amazed and excited about what we have in Jesus. Without

that, any gospel movement – taking the good news to others – will likely be unsuccessful because *we* aren't sold on what we are offering. Without this amazement we won't build an effective community of Christ-followers.

- 9. We must make disciples and not simply converts.
- 10. We must build connections with new people. We don't need more programmes but more disciples. We must get to know a person individually. Each ndividual must feel valued. Being together more often is vitally important. Sharing experiences and reaching out in love with genuine kind spirits.
- 11. We must 'Pray! Pray! Pray!'
 - Bold and focused prayers for all in our community. Having identified a specific need, then begin an intentional "40 days of prayer", using prayer cards. These cards are an easy way to pray for a specific event, neighbours, co-workers, family members, friends. You get to choose. An example of these prayer cards can be sent to you. Email <u>alan.j.moyes@gmail.com</u>
 - Bold and focused prayers for those aged 20 to 35. This age group is missing in so many of our congregations today. We must connect with the younger generation.
- 12. We must have a focused vision and act on it '*Each One Reach One*'.

This is by no means a complete list, but we pray that some of the points mentioned will be helpful and be a way for all of us to *Refresh, Reset and Reignite*.

BRITISH BIBLE SCHOOL NOTES

Friendship is so very important. Solomon wrote about this: "Two are better than one, because they have a good return for their labour: if either of them falls down, one can help the other up. But pity anyone who falls and has no-one to help them up. Also, if two lie down together, they will keep warm. But how can one keep warm alone? Though one may be overpowered, two can defend themselves. A cord of three strands is not quickly broken" (Ecclesiastes 4:9-12 NIV). I think most of us realise the need for friendship, with perhaps your 'best friend' being your spouse, the one you share your life with.

One of the great friendships in the pages of scripture is that of Jonathan and David. They have always been of interest to me because my parents chose to name me after them. Yet, like many friendships, we might wonder why they became friends.

Despite the depictions in our Sunday School materials, they were not that close in age. In fact, it would seem that Jonathan was old enough to be David's father! How do we know this? By looking at what they were doing in 1 Samuel. Just after Saul became king we find Jonathan was one of the commanders in his army. We don't meet David until towards the end of Saul's reign. As Saul reigned for forty years (Acts 13:21), then it would seem that Jonathan was at least twenty years older than

David – and some commentators suggest it could have been 25-30 years older. Yet despite their age difference, Jonathan saw something in David and "became one in spirit with David, and he loved him as himself" (1 Samuel 18:1).

It might be surprising to us that they became friends because David had been designated by God to be the next king. We do not know at what point Jonathan discovered this, but we know he was aware of it when David was on the run as an outlaw and was being chased by Saul and his forces. Jonathan would slip away to meet up with David to encourage him. He told David this: "Don't be afraid. My father Saul will not lay a hand on you. You shall be king over Israel, and I will be second to you. Even my father Saul knows this" (1 Samuel **23:17**). That he would not be king does not seem to have bothered Jonathan, even though as the eldest son of Saul he would most likely have expected to be king. He knew that David trusted in God as he did.

Isn't this is what friendship should be? People who are there to encourage each other when life isn't going well, but especially in their service of God. People who are devoted to the other despite what life might throw at them. We see this so well in the lives of Jonathan and David.

Carol Anne Duncan-Farrell (Kirkcaldy) 1965-2023

On Wednesday, 4th October 2023 many family, friends, colleagues and Church family, each wearing a splash of colour, came together to celebrate a life well lived and bid a fond farewell to Carol Anne Duncan-Farrell.

Carol was born on Saturday, 27th March 1965 to proud parents Pete and Jan Duncan. She was the first of three children. She grew up initially in Dundee but the family moved in 1968 to Glenrothes.

The family journey with the saints at Glenrothes began in 1970 with Carol and her brothers attending Sunday school at the Tenants' Meeting Rooms. Paul McGregor invited Jan and Pete to come along too. Her parents were immersed in 1974 and a little later Carol also became a Christian.

In the early days the church met for worship in the Cullen Club rooms then Woodside Community Halls and finally in 1974 at the newly built Glenrothes church of Christ building in Pitteuchar, Where Carol's mum and dad were both baptised that same year and remained faithful, active members of the congregation. Carol and her brothers continued to attend Sunday school and later they enjoyed Youth Weekends, Camp Heatherbell and the Christmas parties especially when Pete played Santa. A little later Carol, too, was baptised.

After school was over Carol enrolled at Woodmill College, Aberdeen, to study physiotherapy. This led to a career as a physiotherapist and eventually specialist posts at various locations.



It was while working as a physiotherapist that she met Colin Farrell, who became the love of her life. Both shared the same love of travelling, motorbikes and live music.

Sadly, in 1996 Carol contracted M.E. (Chronic Fatigue Syndrome). She returned to the family home in Glenrothes and with medication and determination. Her health improved and she secured a Specialist Physiotherapist post in Fife, which led to further promotions. On Saturday, 20th February 1999 Carol and Colin were married and one year later their daughter Molly was born.

In 2006 cancer was diagnosed but after treatment Carol got the all-clear. In November 2019 her cancer returned and in 2020 she retired. She remained very positive throughout her life in good times and in bad and she demonstrated her unwavering faith in God. With all treatment avenues exhausted a friend invited her on one last road trip to the Isle of Lewis.

Carol passed away on Wednesday, 13th September 2023, at 11.15pm in Stornoway with her husband, Colin and daughter Molly by her side.

EUROPEAN VISION WORKSHOP

The 2023 European Vision Workshop was hosted in Shengjin Lezhe, Albania, from 3rd-5th October. Five representatives of UK congregations attended and were encouraged by meeting about ninety Christians from around Europe and America. Albania went through years of domination and segregation and is now a developing country. Among the population of three million there are thirteen congregations from churches of Christ, with each having a national preacher to assist. The country is beautiful with rolling mountains and a Mediterranean climate.

A vast array of lessons were presented including: spiritual and mental health for church leaders; looking at the real meaning of some Greek words in the Pastoral Epistles; developments in outreach for the blind; news from Healing Hands International and its development for water and food relief; as well as plenty of teaching and preaching encouraging all from the Scriptures.

Among those we met was Oleksander Nilolaienko a Ukrainian preacher who, after being bombed out of several places, now serves in The Netherlands working with Ukrainian children trying to help them normalise their situation. I just can't imagine what those children are going through losing their home, school, friends, family, language, foods, etc. On your behalf I left £500 to help this brother's work from the Christian Worker funds.

The next EVW will be held in the same place next October and I encourage others from the UK to attend and to realise that we are part of a far greater Christian movement and to be encouraged about the faith of many others. Please talk to me about this for more information.

FRANCE

How can that be done? La Maison de Perrine offers a welcoming, Christcentred environment where a person can come and participate in a balanced, structured rhythm of devotion, work, rest, and study. Each module of three weeks, is an opportunity to devote more time to seeking God's will, by directed study of the Word; work on service projects; daily devotional time; enriching local tours; and creative workshops.



These affordable sessions will be offered in April, May, July, and September 2024. God has provided the facility, the resources, the experience, and talents to do this valuable Kingdom work.



This past year we have welcomed several groups who spent time with us. The Harding University Choir was with us for a few days in May and presented two excellent performances. 'Aggies for Christ' were with us for the third time to help with service projects. In July fifteen high school students joined us from California. Last month twenty Augustinian monks came for tea. We made a visit to them to learn of their monastic lifestyle. We were also blessed with visits from Trevor and Pauline Williams as well as Reed Rogers.

This past month we have had to replace the roof on two areas of our building,

the chapel and library wings. Originally we were set to *just* replace one roof, but we noticed that the roof on



FOLLOWING AND WORSHIPPING GOD

It took Solomon seven years to build the temple for God. He began it in the fourth year of his reign and completed it in the eleventh year (1 Kings 6:37-38). He also built a palace for himself which took another thirteen years to build (1 Kings 7:1-12).

Once the temple and all the items to be used in the worship of God were completed, Solomon brought the Ark of the Covenant to be placed in the inner sanctuary. Israel's elders, tribal leaders, and all the men of Israel came to witness the transfer of the Ark to the temple.

Solomon then blessed the assembled Israelites and offered a prayer to God. The prayer is rather long as it is recorded in both the Kings and Chronicles, but there are themes which are worth our attention.

"O Lord, God of Israel, there is no god like you in heaven above or on earth below! You maintain covenantal loyalty to your servants who obey you with sincerity...Now, O Lord, God of Israel, keep the promise you made to your servant, my father David, when you said, 'You will never fail to have a successor ruling before me on the



throne of Israel, provided that your descendants watch their step and serve me as you have done.'" (1 Kings 8:23-25 NET)

There was no god like YHVH, the God of Israel! God had promised that the line of David would always have a king on the throne of Israel. But notice that there was a condition placed on this: provided that they were faithful to God and served him. Today there is no throne in the land of Israel. No descendant of David reigns on a physical throne. But there is one of the lineage of David who is reigning: Jesus the Messiah. His throne isn't a physical one nor is his kingdom physical. He told Pilate, "My kingdom is not of this world." This is the kingdom we are part of as Christians.

"God does not really live on the earth! Look, if the sky and the highest heaven cannot contain you, how much less this temple I have built!" (1 Kings 8:27)

The temple Solomon constructed, from its description, was a building of beauty with the walls covered with gold. It was impressive! But Solomon realised that it could not contain God. In fact, the earth cannot contain him nor can any other part of Creation. The God we serve is so much greater than anything on the earth.

Solomon realised that having a temple would not keep the Israelites faithful to their God. He said, "*The time will come when your people will sin against you (for there is no one who is sinless!) and you will be angry with them and deliver them over to their enemies*" (1 Kings 8:46). He appealed to the people to be faithful but when they sinned to repent and come back to God, asking for forgiveness. The same is true today. We need to realise that we are not sinless and make sure we ask our Father in Heaven to forgive us.

Following and Worshipping God

Solomon realised that God was faithful. He said, "Not one of all the faithful promises he made through his servant Moses is left unfulfilled!" (1 Kings 8:56). Sadly many today are looking for God to still restore a physical kingdom in Israel to fulfil his promises to Moses. Yet time and again in scripture we read that God fulfilled all his promises. Joshua was aware of it (Joshua 23:14) and we see Solomon emphasising the same thing. God fulfilled all his promises to Israel.

May we learn the lessons that Solomon was trying to get his people to understand. "May he make us submissive, so we can follow all his instructions and obey the commandments, rules, and regulations he commanded our ancestors" (1 Kings 8:58).

A people of peace By the time our readers receive this I have no idea what situation the nations of the world will be in. War is the greatest folly of mankind. We can search the stars yet cannot understand the thinking of nations around us. All over the UK we have memorials to those who died in battle in one war or another. We also wear poppies and have Remembrance Sunday. Visiting the National Memorial Arboretum in Alrewas, Burton-on-Trent, is a moving and sobering reminder of the heartache of war, yet it continues.

On our national news we hear of the headline atrocities – today it may be the current Hamas-Israel aggression; yesterday it was Russia against Ukraine, but that yesterday is still very much today's news, if you are Ukrainian. Then there is civil war in Myanmar, Afghanistan, Columbia, Ethiopia, Mali, Yemen, Somalia, South Sudan and Syria. We are called to wash one another's feet, to hold on to those who are slipping away from the faith, to pray without ceasing, and to remember that there is no other name given among men by which we must be saved. Yes, pray for the peace of Jerusalem but never forget the cities, towns and villages of every nation on Earth that are facing the backlash of hatred, violence and discord. Jesus said, 'Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you' (John 15:27).

Lord, make us instruments of your peace. Where there is hatred, let us bring love. Where there is injury, your pardon Lord, And where there is doubt, true faith in you.
