BBS Bassenfell Family Retreat

On Friday 19th January a little over sixty people from around the UK travelled to meet together at Bassenfell Manor Christian Centre in the Lake District. The occasion was the annual family retreat hosted by the British Bible School. The beautiful countryside and grand manor can only ever add to the special time we had together.

Our theme is always around Jesus and this time it related to "Up on the mountain". On arrival Friday evening time was spent refuelling with some nice food and getting acquainted or reacquainted with each other. Prior to breakfast on Saturday and Sunday morning any who wanted could meet together for prayer and reflection. Then when those who have been busy in the kitchen announce it is ready, we enjoy a hearty breakfast together.

The adults spend the morning studying and discussing scripture together. During that time the children and youth do their own thing. This year the youth prepared, acted and filmed a video relating to the topic. Being "Up on the mountain" it was decided to film Noah and the Flood! The more astute of you will realise the flood water covered the mountains and the ark came to rest on a mountain providing us with a link. On Saturday afternoon time was free for everyone to spend how they wished. Some went into Keswick, some found local coffee shops to sit and chat in, and those who could cope with the wind and rain went for a walk. Indoors there were board games and the like, copious amounts of tea and coffee to drink over a chat, and even the opportunity for a nap. Scones with jam and cream were served around 4.00 pm for any who wished to enjoy afternoon tea. Once everyone had returned or woke up it was time to eat a lovely roast dinner and enjoy some very nice desserts.

Our evening activity consisted of several popular games and competitions. Teams of six went from room to room participating in the likes of Pictionary, Taboo, Pin Moses to the mountain and others. It was great fun with a lot of laughs enjoyed.

On Sunday after a good breakfast, we had a time of worship and celebrated the Lord's supper together. After a short break it was time for the presentation of the Blockbuster Noah video by the youth. It was very entertaining whilst carrying with it an important message of God's love yet sure judgment. All present helped to make this a wonderful weekend of spiritual encouragement. Thanks go to those who spent much time cooking, cleaning up, teaching lessons and who provided the activities – they have our gratitude. Every person assisted in some way not just to the whole group but in individual conversations which were an encouragement as well. ARE WE THE CHURCH OF CHRIST OR THE CHURCH OF CHRIST CHURCH?

We have been privileged to visit several countries to share in fellowship with Christians and to minister the Word of God there. We are always thankful for that fellowship; it is usually encouraging, and we always meet loving and kind brothers and sisters. But I am anxious for those churches under the banner 'Church of Christ'.

It is easy enough to refer to Romans 16:16 but I wonder if someone chose to call themselves the 'Church of God', according to 1 Corinthians 1:2, what would everyone else say? I well remember when we built the chapel in Northampton we called the premises 'The Christian Fellowship Centre'; we did that because we firmly believed that the people and not the building was and is the church, the body of Christ. Yet wherever I go I see the name 'Church of Christ' on signposts or places of worship where we meet. In the 1800's some of our chapels were named, such as Hope Chapel in Kentish Town, London. Many also simply had some brick work above the front door stating 'Christian Meeting Place' or words to that effect. The Summer Lane congregation in Birmingham had engraved on the communion plates 'A Christian Church', in no way referring to a denomination but noting that we are Christians only. This phrase from the pulpit was often used, that 'we are Christians only but not the only Christians'. What has happened over my lifetime is that Churches of Christ seem to have become 'The Church of Christ Church'.

In my role as editor of the *Christian Worker*, I often get e-mails asking for where the church of Christ is in this town or that. Knowing of no organised congregation I usually refer them to our website, www.churchesofchrist.co.uk, to look to see

> where places are meeting that chose to include themselves in the list.

Some who have come from other countries to the UK have not necessarily enjoyed the fellowship offered by existing congregations and have formed churches more to their own liking either in language or traditions. Sadly, this does not always bode well for fellowship with other congregations. This could result in a wedge being driven in to the point where one group can feel itself superior to another, often believing that they are more scriptural than others.

Somewhere around 1964 much was written in the magazine that circulated

around the congregations in the UK at the time discussing the number of containers for the fruit of the vine that could be on the Lord's Table. As I remember, the discussion could be vitriolic and as a young Christian I found it to be weakening for faith. Of course, at the same time, it was the fashion for teen boys to grow their hair as long as they could or dared, before getting in trouble with the church leaders and being told that hair was for a woman's glory. Then the sisters were being told off because they started to wear trousers and were told they looked like men so they were in the wrong. These things come and go, but when we start to make proclamations, we start to step outside of the revealed Word and make the Church of Christ Church.

Of course, those congregations which refer to themselves as Churches of Christ often have their own flavour. Across the world there are those who say children's Bible classes are wrong, that eating in the place of worship is wrong, that multiple cups are wrong, that having anything but a loaf of bread on the communion table is wrong, that using alcoholic wine in communion is wrong. Every time we make declarations like this, we make creeds, and we must note again that we have no creed but the Bible. There are of course many groups who believe in the authority of The Bible, but their practises and teachings are very different from ours.

I remember our late brother Graham Fisher reporting that many congregations tell of baptisms for the remission of sins yet failing to mention anything about the receiving of the gift of The Holy Spirit according to Acts 2:38. Of course people could argue that it is not the words that are said at the time of baptising that is important but the act itself. The assumption for the individual may be true, and we all learn more about baptism after becoming a Christian than beforehand. Yet it is wise for those leading baptismal services to declare fully what baptism is all about. The purpose is important.

It is not that we are members of the 'church of Christ', used as a title, that is important, but rather that we are servants and followers of Jesus and by grace are part of the fellowship of believers. There may well be some variations in practise by different congregations. I remember when we moved to work with the church in Bristol, I had one letter from a 'brother' who objected to me taking off my jacket in service even though I was very warm. He also did not like the way that I broke the communion loaf into smaller pieces. At the time the front row consisted of older sisters with very shaky hands who had difficulty passing the plate along let alone trying to break off a piece of bread for themselves. They found it helpful to have the bread broken into pieces so they could take a piece, while our brother at the back did not.

The Apostle Paul wrote, 'We do not dare to classify or compare ourselves with some who commend themselves. When they measure themselves by themselves and compare themselves with themselves, they are not wise.... For it is not the one who commends himself who is approved, but the one whom the Lord commends' (2 Corinthians 10:12,18).

So, what am I trying to get at, as someone might say? The name 'Church of Christ' is not a noun, it is not a title; it is an adjective, a descriptive word. The church belongs to Jesus, it is his body. 'This mystery is that through the gospel the Gentiles are heirs together with Israel, members together of one body and sharers together in the promise in Christ Jesus' (Ephesians 3:6). We should not become a denomination but remain simply Christians.

I would like to say more but at least I hope that if anyone even reads this, they will think about what I am trying to say. Thank you.

THE FINAL WORD



The 'right hand of fellowship' (Galatians 2:9) Recently I was in an assembly where no one knew Pauline nor me. We were welcomed at the door by having a newsletter put into our hand but no other comment. We went and sat down on a pew about halfway down the aisle, in touching distance of anyone walking past. No one talked to us. I resisted doing what I normally do and just push myself forward shaking hands and smiling at people I may or may not know. We sat and wondered if we were just being ignored or overlooked or unwanted or in someone's seat. We sat and looked for someone to say, 'hello'. No one did.

We went through Bible class; we went through worship. There were people at the other end of the long pew, perhaps we should have shuffled along and introduced ourselves. We didn't – and they didn't. We sat. The service was as



we expected: singing, preaching, praying, communion. It was not until the last prayer was said that the congregation suddenly came to life. They stood, they talked, but no one came to us, no one shook our hand; the aisle was filled, but no one looked our way. Finally someone came past and said, 'Are you a visitor? – so am I!' Eventually I could stand it no longer and went over to the young man who had led the singing and thanked him for his service. I had to shake someone's hand.

As the crowd eventually thinned out, we started to talk to one or two, but the handshakes seemed a long way off. I wondered if it was not done in that church or was it the remnant of covid? Why did they not shake my hand? It felt for a little while that I was a stranger in a different sort of church to the ones I knew.

In fact, we were strangers, no one knew my name, no one was looking out for us – we were outsiders even though we believed the same thing. We realised then just how important a handshake is – and a smile of welcome. It reminded me that the visitor to that meeting was not as important as the regular attenders. It reminded me that when in my own familiar place of worship the unknown person, the guest, may be there with a broken heart, or a need to see the face of Jesus in the worshippers. At the very least they may need a handshake.

A handshake costs nothing, is something anyone can do, and yet can be a great start to sharing the message of love that we see in the gospel of Jesus.
