MY PERSPECTIVE



What a strange time we live in

Politics fascinate me. I realise that many – if not most – find what happens in our governments and the political parties to be totally boring. But I don't. I don't take an active part in politics – being an American eliminates most involvement in British politics and living so far from my country of citizenship makes it impractical to be involved there. And I'm not sure I would want to be involved. I find politics, especially in both countries just now, to be divisive and, as Christians, I believe we should be trying to unite people – in Jesus.

What should be our view of politics and governments as Christians? Jesus had something to say about this, as recorded by his apostles and prophets. Notice what the apostles wrote.

"Let everyone be subject to the governing authorities, for there is no authority except that which God has established...For the one in authority is God's servant for your good...

Therefore, it is necessary to submit to the authorities, not only because of possible punishment but also as a matter of conscience.

This is also why you pay taxes, for the authorities are God's servants, who give their full time to governing." (Romans 13:1-6 NIV)

"Submit yourselves for the Lord's sake to every human authority: whether to the emperor, as the supreme authority, or to governors, who are sent by him to punish those who do wrong and to commend those who do right...Show proper respect to everyone, love the family of believers, fear God, honour the emperor." (1 Peter 2:13-17)

"I urge, then, first of all, that petitions, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for all people – for kings and all those in authority,

that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness." (1 Timothy 2:1-2)

Did you notice a theme running through these verses? We are to be subject to our human governments. Why? Because, as bad as they often are, God has established them. They are God's servant for our good. And we are to pray for them!

I can already hear people objecting: but you don't realise how bad our government is! I think our problem is that we don't realise how really bad the government was that Paul and Peter were living in and wrote about. The emperor was Nero. He was one of the most cruel of the Roman emperors and was responsible for the deaths of many Christians. Yet scripture still says we are to be "subject to the governing authorities", we are to honour them, and we are to pray for them. Part of the reason is "that we may live peaceful and quiet lives".

Perhaps part of the reason people get so contentious about politics is that, to them, this is the only life we will ever have. That is not the case for Christians. Yes we live *in* the world but, as we often say, we are not to be *of* the world. We look forward to a better home with Jesus. Let us not get embroiled in the politics of this life but look forward to what we will have in eternity with Jesus.

"But our citizenship is in heaven. And we eagerly await a Saviour from there, the Lord Jesus Christ, who, by the power that enables him to bring everything under his control, will transform our lowly bodies so that they will be like his glorious body." (Philippians 3:20-21)

BRITISH BIBLE SCHOOL NOTES

A faithful watchman

Although our cities and towns no longer have watchmen, I think we can understand their function and the need for them in days of the past. The watchman was the person who stood 'watch', looking for the enemy or anything that might threaten the settlement of people, especially while they were sleeping. We might call them a 'lookout'. We find a good description of a watchman in the book of Ezekiel.

"The word of the Lord came to me: 'Son of man, speak to your people and say to them: "When I bring the sword against a land, and the people of the land choose one of their men and make him their watchman, and he sees the sword coming against the land and blows the trumpet to warn the people, then if anyone hears the trumpet but does not heed the warning and the sword comes and takes their life, their blood will be on their own head. Since they heard the sound of the trumpet but did not heed the warning, their blood will be on their own head. If they had heeded the warning, they would have saved themselves. But if the watchman sees the sword coming and does not blow the trumpet to warn the people and the sword comes and takes someone's life, that person's life will be taken because of their sin, but I will hold the watchman accountable for their blood."" (Ezekiel 33:1-6 NIV)

A watchman was to warn the people of danger. If he did his job and the people listened, they would be able to get to safety. If they heard the warning and ignored it then when they were captured or conquered it wasn't the fault of the watchman – he did what he was supposed to do. But if he saw danger coming and did not sound a warning then the watchman would be responsible for the death of the people and would be held accountable.

"'Son of man, I have made you a watchman for the people of Israel; so hear the word I speak and give them warning from me. When I say to the wicked, "You wicked person, you will surely die," and you do not speak out to dissuade them from their ways,

that wicked person will die for their sin, and I will hold you accountable for their blood. But if you do warn the wicked person to turn from their ways and they do not do so, they will die for their sin, though you yourself will be saved." (Ezekiel 33:7-9)

Ezekiel was a watchman for God's people but not someone to warn them of a physical attack that might be coming. Ezekiel was to be their spiritual watchman. He was to watch how they were living and persuade them to change if their lives were characterised by sin.

This was serious: if he did not try to warn them to change then he would be held responsible. Both the wicked and Ezekiel would be punished by God. If he did warn them and they refused to listen at least he would do what God wanted him to do. He would be saved while they would die in their sin because they refused to listen to God's word.

Is there not an application for us as God's people today? Although we have congregational leaders who watch over us, as a shepherd does the sheep, there is an extent to which we must watch out for each other. Paul wrote to the Christians in Philippi to be humble and "value others above yourselves, not looking to your own interests but each of you to the interests of the others" (Philippians 2:3-4). The anonymous writer of Hebrews reminds us to "encourage one another daily, as long as it is called 'Today', so that none of you may be hardened by sin's deceitfulness" (Hebrews 3:13).

We, too, are to be watchman, warning those who are in danger from sin and encouraging each other as we live for Jesus. May we be faithful watchmen.

If you are in the northeast of Scotland, plan to be with us 7^{th} - 8^{th} June as we complete our study of the prophet Ezekiel.

MILTON KEYNES

The congregation in Milton Keynes owes its existence to the unwavering dedication of three young former university students from Ghana: Douglas Mensah, Ato Nimoh-Brema, and Yvonne Nimoh-Brema. Their shared faith and commitment propelled them to establish a vibrant congregation in the city. Overcoming initial challenges, including the collapse of a previous congregation, they began meeting in 2004, initially in the home of Ato and Yvonne. Their perseverance and God's blessings led to the congregation's growth in both size and strength. They moved to the Netherfield Meeting place with a spirit of outreach and collaboration. The congregation stands today as a testament to their enduring faith and community spirit.

At the beginning of 2023, it became a consuming desire to appoint overseers in line with the provisions in scripture (1 Timothy 3:1-7; Titus 1:5-9; 1 Peter 5:1-4). The group spent a considerable length of time studying scriptural leadership and, in particular, the qualifications of

elders. After this awareness creation, the congregation was ready to appoint elders.

A vetting committee was created to oversee the appointment of elders for the Lord's church at Milton. After several months of work, the committee introduced Samuel Adorm and Nathaniel Oppong as men to be appointed. Samuel became a Christian 1981 and has been worshipping with the Milton Keynes congregation since 2007. He is married with three children (all Christians). Nathaniel became a Christian in 1987 and has been an active Christian in Milton Keynes since 2014. He is married with four children (two of whom are Christians).



The ordination event was held on Sunday, 5th May, after the worship. Kunle Orekoya, an elder at the Lord's church at Northampton, officiated the ordination, assisted by brothers from other congregations. This was followed by a fellowship

meal where guests were treated to good food, good fellowship and good singing from the youth at Milton Keynes and Luton.

We continue to ask for prayers for the new elders and the entire congregation.

SOME THOUGHTS ON THE GODHEAD

One of my favourite hymns is Reginald Heber's uplifting 'Holy, Holy, Holy' in combination with John B. Dykes' rousing tune Nicaea. Growing up as I did in a congregation that used the American Great Songs of the Church, I was used to singing the final line as "God in three Persons, blessed eternally" and only found out much later that Heber's original words were "God in three Persons, blessed Trinity" when we switched to Favourite Hymns of the Church in 1995. I think it was the late Albert Winstanley who pointed out to me that some of our American brethren were uncomfortable using the word 'Trinity' as it does not appear in the Bible and so preferred the word 'Godhead' which does but which would not fit the scansion of Heber's hymn.

I might be wrong in attributing this anecdote to Albert but it was certainly one of our senior brothers who told the story and then went on to wonder whether some of our brethren are frightened of the Trinity, not just using the word. Certainly, the doctrine of the Holy Trinity is not an easy one. For centuries, generations of our sisters and brothers in the ancient church struggled with the concept of God being one and yet also three. In more recent times (relatively recent) there were some in the seventeenth and eighteenth centuries who objected to the doctrine of the Trinity – Isaac Newton being one of the best-known - and the rise of the Unitarian Church, a non-Trinitarian denomination, gives further support to the statement that the Trinity might be a difficult doctrine to defend.

However, defending the Trinity is, to adapt Spurgeon's statement on defending Scripture, is like defending a lion: we just have to let it out of its cage and it can look after itself. Those ancient summaries of the faith known as the creeds (from *credo*, Latin for "I believe") do not include the

Trinity or Godhead as such. Christians who recite a creed daily or weekly proclaim their belief in one God: Father, Son, and Spirit. No more needed to be said. The creeds were compiled in the years pre-printing when the Bible was not readily available to the majority so a creed as a statement of faith was an easy way of establishing what Christians did and did not believe.

Like the Jews, Christians believe in one God, to which Jews and pagans would respond that a belief in Father, Son, and Spirit does not sound like a belief in one God. However, Christians can respond by explaining that we worship Jesus as truly God, not a demi-god or a created son of God. Jesus is in every way possible God who, for a time, entered into his creation as a real, in every way possible, human being. The Egyptian bishop Athanasius (c.296 – 373) wrote On the Incarnation in which he points out that if Jesus was not truly human then his moral example is just a sham and if he is not truly God His sacrificial death cannot save us. QED, although there is a lot more to it than that. Similar arguments were later used to express the certainty that the Spirit was an equal part of the Godhead and that we need all three Persons, Father, Son and Spirit, if we are to truly know and begin to understand the love of our Creator, the example of our Saviour and the comfort of being filled with the Spirit. "God in three Persons, blessed Trinty" indeed.

MALAWI

We are now almost getting out of the lean period here in Malawi of which we can now have a sigh of relief. Farm produce are now being harvested and sold so most households can at least have one meal a day. This is good as it improves attendance as well for worship on Sunday.



Evangelism & Outreach Programme

Worship on Sunday and follow-up to those not attending has been the main activity during the week. This has lead Congregation. There has been also some improvements to youth participation and the English worship, which most of them prefer to attend. The average attendance for this is now 28 while the main Tumbuka meeting is 117. Rural congregations average attendance is 9-35. So far a total of 23 baptisms and 31 restorations have been reported from the rural congregations.



On 10th February we had the Preachers' meeting at Ng'ongo where we agreed to have our annual one week Bible School at Ekwendeni from 4th-9th August, then a gospel meeting from Friday evening to 11th August. If you have time and resources, you are cordially invited to come and teach or just attend. We have also planned nine major village Gospel meetings this year.

On 8th March I travelled to Lilongwe Airport to welcome Nicole Barr and Edwin Offin from Scotland who visited to see the work of the five preachers they

support. The trip was good as it gave them first-hand information about the Lord's work in Malawi and what challenges the Christians here face.

Ladies Programme

During the visit of Nicole and Edwin I took advantage to teach the congregations leaders to encourage the women to have Bible classes once a week as is the case in Ekwendeni. As I reported in my previous report, we do have more women in our respective congregations than men and they can only help more in congregation activities including teaching each other if they know the Bible. The women are generally too shy to ask questions during Sunday Bible class hence the need to have their own during the week.

Youth Programme

Not much has been done apart from attending Sunday worship and the Bible Class on Sunday afternoon. Most of these are students and this term they are due to write exams. However after July they have proposed a number of activities like visiting the elderly and youth meetings.

Benevolence & Church building Projects

We are not doing much on this due to limited resources despite our church is congregation having more needy Christians whose income is mostly less than a dollar per day. This trend of hoping to be helped has also made us to have very poor or dilapidated church buildings which sometimes pose danger mainly in rainy season. We are appealing to each other to have the Manolo Church building roofed.

We have one big orphanage that has 75 children with special needs. The director found money to replace the old wooden windows with new plastic ones, which are much more energy efficient and keep the heat in better. They are looking for help to purchase the windows (they are more looking for the building material itself).

They have 232 windows in total. As much as I would like to replace them all, I realise I can't. So I decided to find out the cost of one window and if someone can help, I could help with at least a few windows. Four windows is one bedroom where 6 children sleep! It costs 4000 hryvnias to make one window (about £78). I will use the funds I have and could use more. (The *Christian Worker* has sent around £225 to help in this.)
