

Hebrews 13 says "Let brotherly love continue" and once again Cumbernauld Men's Day 2025 delivered in that. It was an enriching and uplifting day with brothers of all ages from all over the country coming together once again to sing praises to our God, hear from his word and to lift each other up in brotherly fellowship – a day where our souls and bodies were truly fed!

There were over 40 men present rekindling old bonds, strengthening current ones, and forming new relationships. The theme for this year was "Together" with the passage of the day being Acts 2:42, from which we had four speakers to give us fantastic lessons.

The day started off as always with the feeding of the body with delicious crispy bacon rolls and a cup of coffee or tea. Then it was time to feed the spirit. We were led in song by Adam Barr and with one voice praised our God in song.

Our first lesson of the day was by Charles Takyi from the Cumbernauld congregation. He taught us about being "Together in Doctrine". His message was powerful and direct and set the bar high for the rest of the speakers. He conveyed to us the importance of having the same doctrine taught irrespective of where we are in the world and emphasised how "important being together is to God." His lesson was followed by our first break session of the day with tea, coffee, muffins, doughnuts, and a time of fellowship.

We then headed in for the next session where we were led in song by Edwin Offin and given a very uplifting and encouraging lesson titled "Together in Fellowship" from Mark Hill, an elder at the Northampton congregation. His message was





simple: "'Church' is now our culture", emphasising the need for us to build each other up and to use our differences for the benefit of each other.

It was then lunchtime and the ladies from Cumbernauld did not disappoint, with a range of homemade soups, sandwiches and sausage rolls topped off with a wide array of desserts – our bodies were filled! Thank you so much to the efforts made by the ladies to make days like these a huge success.



In our next session we began with singing led by Charlie Clark – although young he led songs as if he had been leading for years. Our third speaker of the day was Graham McDonald from Cumbernauld, who had a great lesson standing in for Charles Yankiah who, due to a family emergency, couldn't be with us. Graham delivered an inspiring message titled "Together in Life & Worship" where he focused on the life we now have thanks to the sacrifice God made for us and how that should reflect in our worship of him because, as Graham put it, "We now have peace with God."

We then had our final break of the day where the special home bakes and tray bakes came out for us to enjoy with another time of fellowship.

In our final session where we were led in song by Brian Buchanan and given a very powerful and



thought provoking lesson Leigh Halliday, from the congregation in Stirling, entitled "Together in Prayer." His message to us emphasised the power of prayer and the importance of praying for each other. He left us with the final thought and question of the day "Does our 'fellowship' devote themselves to the prayers?"

What an great day this was. We're thankful for Graham McDonald in organising this day each year, to the Cumbernauld congregation for hosting the day, for the ladies who provided the food and served us, for the lessons presented by our speakers, for the men that led in songs and prayers, and for all who attended making this a day one to remember. The constant assault on God is undermining the faith of many Christians, including our young people. As Christians we need to be prepared to give an answer for what we believe (1 Peter 3:15-16).



Sheila Moyes 17th September 1933 -24^{4th} January 2025 (Kirkcaldy)

Born at The Walk in Dysart to Walter & Margaret (Meg) McDonald, Sheila was the last of six children – five girls and one boy. Raised in a Christian family, Sheila was immersed for the forgiveness of her sins as a young woman at the Rose Street congregation in Kirkcaldy. Her *love* for the congregation was obvious through her years of service in various areas: Sunday School teacher; the women's meeting group where she also served as treasurer; and active in visiting.

When she left Viewforth High School she went straight to work at Allen Lithographers as a book binder. Later she worked in a record shop in Markinch as well as in various cleaning jobs.

Sheila first cast eyes on Ian Moyes when she was only 14 and it was *love* at first sight, but everyone said, "*To young!*" But five years later they married on 2nd March 1954 in Rose Street, Kirkcaldy. Her bridesmaid on that day was her life-long friend, Anne Brown. Ian and Sheila set up home in Markinch, then Massereene Road, Kirkcaldy, and finally Woodlands Walk, Dunnikier Park, Kirkcaldy. From there Sheila moved to the Barrogil House Care Home after having some falls.

Amid all this they were blessed with three children: Alan, Derek, and Diane and the rest of the clan whom she dearly *loved*. In addition to her three children there was their spouses: Ruth, Vivien & Wayne; her grandchildren Yvette, Aaron, Euan and Kerin; and their spouses: David, Lauren,



Emily and Ryan; and her greatgrandchildren: Finlay, Alfie, Scarlet; Florence, Noah; Amelie, Hallie; Harrison and Marley. Family was core for Sheila.

Sheila spent over three years at Barrogil House Care Home who did a great job looking after her. A quote from some of the staff at Barrogil – "I wish we had forty Sheila's". When Sheila was being taken out of Barrogil by the funeral director all the staff formed an 'Honour Guard' along the passageway right to the front door – amazing!

The service at the crematorium was led bye Ian Starrs and was well attended and "The Dash Poem" was read by her granddaughter Yvette O'Neil. Another poem in the hymn sheet contained this line "What matters is how we live and love." The recurring word about mum was "LOVED".

She *loved* good food; she *loved* family caravan holidays; she *loved* to talk to people when out; she *loved* to visit people or have people in her home; she *loved* singing; she *loved* knitting; she *loved* shopping; she *loved* her

wee sayings. When you have love and kindness – from a mother, a gran, a great-gran, or friend –and that person is no longer. there it's hard.

Jesus' first disciples experienced that sad feeling, too, when Jesus told them he was leaving this world and about to die – not peacefully, but on the cross as a sacrifice for their (and our) sins. John's Gospel records Jesus saying to them: "sorrow has filled your hearts" (John 16:6) because he is going, and they couldn't follow at that time. But Jesus also said to them: "Let not your hearts be troubled..." (John 14:1). And then, "...you have sorrow now, but I will see you again and your hearts will rejoice, and no one will take your joy from you" (John 16:22).

What Jesus was leaving them with hope and joy. Where they were troubled and had sorrowful hearts,

there was also joy because of hope in Jesus. This is not the common hope of chance happening, but the Biblical hope of confidence. He told them, "...I go to prepare a place for you, I will come again and take you to myself, that where I am you may be also." (John 14:3). This is the hope, the confident expectation, of the disciple, the follower of Jesus (then and now). And that's Sheila.

But great as all of the things she loved in life may be, above all she had *love* for her Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ. This was marked by her commitment to him at a young age and evidenced throughout her life. Now she has that joy in its fullness – and she would want that for everyone.

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THE FINAL WORD



The perfection of love

Fifty years ago, I was a student at North Ireland Bible School in Belfast. It was a time of six hours a day lectures, six hours of homework plus time for lesson preparation, as well as being involved with my family as a dad and husband. Those who went through the same programme will remember times when we heard bombs going off and shootings, sometimes in the streets as well as the occasional burned-out lorry in the road because of 'The Troubles'. It was sometimes hard to keep focussed on spiritual matters. However, our beloved teachers pushed us through the courses and sources of their material. As I remember, only once did I have a strong disagreement with what was shared and that was to do with 1 Corinthians 13:10 -"...but when perfection comes, the imperfect disappears'.

I had always been taught that when a text is taken out of context it becomes a pretext, and I believe that is the correct way we should interpret scripture. When we look at the passage from verses 1-8, we note that seven times the emphasis on the discussion is love. Chapter 12 deals with various spiritual gifts and lead us to the most excellent way of all, that being love.

The theme of chapter 13 is developed in noting that some spiritual gifts may be stilled or even pass away (v.9), particularly when as grown-up and developed Christians we become adults in love. That love is the love of God and Christ's love in us and – dare I say it – love for God's people, the church. This all comes to a conclusion in verse 13 with these beautiful words: 'And now these three remain: faith, hope and love. But the greatest of these is love'.

We must ask ourselves: 'what is the passage talking about other than love?' Yet in class, all those years ago, we were told that when perfection comes the imperfect will disappear means when the New Testament is completely written, all spiritual gifts will disappear. Sadly, this has been reiterated in various places, and I am sad. The scriptures which we all love, and respect were not completed nor universally scattered for several centuries and even now we only have translations for our own use.

So why am I upset about the teaching. First, the whole passage is talking about love – eight times it tells us what it is talking about. Secondly, God's people cannot exist without love – when this spiritual gift is absent the body of Christ is starved of the very essence of the gospel: 'for God so loved the world'... 'Love one another as I have loved you'. Love is the basis of forgiveness and if ever there was a group that needed love it was the Corinthian assembly.

When love is removed as priority we are left with a book of history and guidelines. It is only love that can fill the hearts of mankind, that can bring tears to eyes of the penitent. Love is not only the basis of family and society, but also the essence of The Almighty; it is the reason why God created the Heavens and the Earth and why God, in the form of the Incarnate God, hung on Calvary's cross.

We place great emphasis on baptism but unless we are baptised to join ourselves with Christ in his love, we are not really baptised. It is all of love, from Heaven to us and from us back into the arms of God. Here is love vast as the oceans – may it never be diminished.
