The Bedminster congregation in Bristol is pleased to be celebrating 85 years of service to our community from our little chapel on St. Johns Lane. The congregation began in the 1860s, but through the faithfulness and commitment of the brethren in 1939 purchased our current church building as a tool for teaching the good news of Jesus.

We enjoyed a weekend celebrating our anniversary on 13th-14th April with thanksgiving for all God has done in Bristol.

On Saturday morning we had a lovely Sunday School reunion, welcoming back many from the community whom we have not seen in recent years – including some who came to Sunday School in the 1950s.

During the afternoon we worshipped and praised God together. We were pleased to welcome back Trevor and Pauline Williams who worked with the congregation in Bristol from 1996 to 2009. Trevor spoke and encouraged the congregation on Saturday afternoon and challenged us further during our Sunday morning worship.

We took a stroll down memory lane with Geoff Daniell, who is part of our ministry team, and has a



long memory of the work of the congregation – from the first Holiday Bible Schools, film strip evenings, camps at Goblin Coombe, relief missions to Romania and Poland, community outreach in our local park days, annual Gospel Trail, a benevolent service called Love-on-the Lane, the beginning of the Seed and Fertiliser and Orphan projects in Malawi, mission trips to India, and Autumn Thanksgiving Outreach among other blessings God has seen fit to propose in Bedminster.

On Sunday local speakers spurred us on to consider the cloud of witnesses that precede us, the endurance that disciplines us, and the hope that inspires us. We concluded the weekend with an international fellowship meal which highlighted the twenty nations represented in the fellowship here.

My own relationship with Bedminster congregation began in 1998 and I have been privileged to see how God has grown his people in Bristol during the past 25 years. The face of Bedminster today looks quite different than it once did!

Many thanks to those from the Newport, Ilkeston and Brighton congregations for coming to celebrate with us.

BRITISH BIBLE SCHOOL NOTES

A sad ending but hopeful

beginning

There are many sad incidents in the pages of scripture. One of the saddest in my view is what Ezekiel recorded in chapters 10 and 11 of his vision.

In chapter 8 Ezekiel was taken in a vision to Jerusalem to the temple of the Lord. There he saw worship of almost anything but the worship of God.

"And he said to me, 'Son of man, do you see what they are doing – the utterly detestable things the Israelites are doing here, things that will drive me far from my sanctuary? But you will see things that are even more detestable.'" (Ezekiel 8:6 NIV)

In the temple dedicated by Solomon to the worship of YHVH, the God of Israel and only true God, the elders were worshipping every kind of creature made, the women were worshipping the false god Tammuz, and the priests were worshipping the sun (Ezekiel 8:7-18). There were almost none left in the city of Jerusalem who were still faithful to God.

In chapter 9 God had the people who were

faithful marked for protection while the rest would be slaughtered.

It is when we get to chapter 10 that we see that God is forsaking his city. God is depicted in what many refer to as his war chariot, a scene very similar to God's throne

room in Revelation 4 only this one moves. God slowly left the temple and the city (read about this in Ezekiel 10:4, 18-19; 11:22-23).

There was no hope left for those in the city. They refused to listen to God's word given through his prophets. God's glory left the temple and the city, leaving it open for destruction.

But there was still hope. Although they would be sent far away into other nations to be in exile, God would gather them, bring them back and give them the land of Israel once again.

"They will return to it and remove all its vile images and detestable idols. I will give them an undivided heart and put a new spirit in them; I will remove from them their heart of stone and give them a heart of flesh. Then they will follow my decrees and be careful to keep my laws. They will be my people, and I will be their God." (Ezekiel 11:18-20)


Although it was sad that it reached the point that God forsook the temple and his people, he would bring them back. But notice that there had to be a change. They needed an undivided heart and a new spirit. They had to be obedient to God and be careful to obey him.

Isn't it the same for us? When we sin and refuse to change we withdraw from God. Because of our sin the fellowship is broken. In order to resume a relationship with God we must give up the sin so we can have an undivided heart. We must allow God's Spirit to once again reside in us. And we must once again be obedient to what God has asked of us.

May we all seek to be faithful followers of our Lord and Saviour.

If you are in the northeast of Scotland, plan to be with us 7th-8th June as we complete our study of the prophet Ezekiel.

WHAT IS THE STATE OF YOUR PLACE OF WORSHIP?

King Joash was only seven years of age when he came to the throne of Judah. The temple under his wicked grandmother Athaliah had been left in a dreadful state. Under the guidance of the King's brotherin-law, Jehoiada, the high priest, raised funds for the repair of the Temple built by Solomon. After 27 years of fund raising nothing had yet been done by the priests so King Joash gave an order. 'The priests agreed that they would not collect any more money from the

people and that they would not repair the temple themselves' (2 Kings 12:8). So begins an account of getting the people in who knew what they were supposed to do.

Very often congregations feel that they do not have enough money to pay for repairs on their places of worship and so either a bad job is done or it is left undone. Perhaps congregations might think ahead, realising that repairs have to be made and it would be better to get professionals to do the work rather than Christians doing a poor

job. Sadly history repeats itself and it sometimes can work out more expensive for amateurs to work on property rather than a professional.

The story of the repair of Solomon's temple can be found in 2 Kings 12 and makes for interesting reading for those who are in leadership of congregations.

THE FINAL WORD



The effects of smoking

The Prime Minister is attempting to take away freedom of choice by trying to ban smoking in society. He has pointed out that smoking kills 80,000 people in the United Kingdom every year and it causes one in four cancer related deaths. By banning smoking billions of pounds will be saved for our NHS.

It seems to me that smoking has had its day and it has not come too soon. Many people think that they are fine if they smoke, but it smells, it is expensive, it is harmful. And anyone who thinks that they can hide cigarette smoking only fools themselves – those who do not smoke can smell cigarettes on people as soon as they walk into a room. This for many is far worse than bad body odour.

Chris Whitty, the chief medical officer, says that cigarette smoking increases stillbirths, asthma, heart disease and premature death. Why do Christians still involve themselves with this sort of drug taking?

On 20th April the Wembley congregation hosted a seminar dealing with pancreatic cancer. The first cause of pancreatic cancer is smoking and, like the wages of sin,

those who smoke have to pay for creating cancer in their body. Sadly, people who smoke can offer secondary smoking to the people around them that can create asthma and various throat infections. I know that by experience having grown up in a family of those who smoked.

There are some who may feel that through the medium of the Christian Worker magazine that my opinions should not be broadcast to our brotherhood, but I know that smoking kills. My father smoked for years and he died in agony, diagnosed with cancer of the lung first of all, then cancer of the throat and finally cancer of the bone. My father-in-law could not attend our wedding because he had smoked all of his life and just three weeks before our wedding, he had a heart attack caused by smoking and had to remain in hospital. Six weeks after his 65th birthday my one and only brother died with abdominal aortic aneurysm caused by years of smoking.

You might say, 'well I've smoked all my life and I'm OK'. You may be all right today, but will you be alright next week or next year? I pray for my brothers and

sisters that if they are involved in smoking in any way, shape or form –including vaping – please, please, please, remove it from your daily routine and offer your body completely as a living sacrifice to our Lord Jesus Christ, which is our reasonable service (Romans 12:1). Please don't smell like a smouldering pile of compost anymore. If you are a long-term smoker, I know giving it up may be hard for you, but better to give it up voluntarily than to be forced to because you have cancer.
