MY PERSPECTIVE



Do we want peace?

The world longs for peace. We long for peace. We pray for peace. And sometimes it seems peace is within our grasp.

The recent ceasefire has been welcomed by the world, yet we wonder if it will really hold. Can there be peace in the countries of the Middle East. Even the current cease-fire keeps being broken, yet this time they continue to return to it.

What about the conflict between Ukraine and Russia? Will there ever be peace? We were privileged to spend two weekends this past month with the congregation in Shepshed where there is a Christian family from Ukraine. Although they desperately long to get home they have no illusions that peace is coming soon. It was eye-opening to hear the husband pray during worship about the need for peace in their land.

It seems that war and conflict have characterised humans since the beginning. Of the original family, one son killed another. They were not at peace. When we look back just over one hundred years we see conflict and war gong on almost continually: The Great War, World War Two, the Korean conflict, the Vietnam conflict, the Argentina crisis, the Gulf War and the second Gulf War – and the list goes on and on.

What makes it even worse is when Christians are not at peace with each other. Yet this is what Jesus wants amongst his people. In fact the blessing he gave when he first appeared to the disciples and apostles after his resurrection was "Peace be with you." When Paul wrote his letters he included the common Christian greeting:

"Grace and Peace." Perhaps we should make that our greeting, too!

Peace is part of the fruit that God's Spirit produces in our lives. "But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, forbearance, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and selfcontrol. Against such things there is no law" (Galatians 5:22-23 NIV). Did you notice what goes with peace that would help maintain peace? – forbearance, kindness, goodness, gentleness and self-control. If we have those traits in our lives they will help us to be a person of peace.

What does this say about someone who doesn't have these traits? As these are produced by the Spirit then we have no evidence that the Spirit is in their lives.

When Paul talked about the 'fruit of the Spirit' he also talked about the 'acts of the flesh'. When we read through that list (Galatians 5:19-21) we see that these are the very opposite of how a Christian is to live. These traits – hatred, discord, jealousy, rage, selfishness, factions, envy – are those who eliminate peace. But how often have we seen these in Christians?

Do we want lives of peace or lives of discord and disunity? It all depends on how we are living. "Those who belong to Christ Jesus have crucified the flesh with its passions and desires. Since we live by the Spirit, let us keep in step with the Spirit. Let us not become conceited, provoking and envying each other" (Galatians 5:24-26).

Do we want peace? Then we need to get rid of envy and keep in step with the Spirit.

BRITISH BIBLE SCHOOL NOTES

Evidences

Shepshed

Two encouraging weekends of study took place in Shepshed during October as we looked at Evidences for God and Creation. These are part of what the British Bible School is developing and teaching as a resource for congregations in this country.

During this past year a few of us were discussing what it was that Christians needed in this country and especially our young people. As the schools and media constantly bombard us with information that is supposed to show that belief in God and the Bible is outdated, we felt that presenting lessons on evidences for God, Jesus, the Bible and Creation might be useful. Jon Galloway and Mark Hill set out to create two weekends of study (fourteen lessons) that could help in this area.

We discovered very quickly that there is much more information than we could cover in fourteen lessons! We decided what was best to include and have presented these lessons to three congregations this year and those from other groups who came along, as well (many thanks to Patrick Boyns for filling in for Mark in the most recent study weekends in Shepshed).

With the enthusiasm these lessons have generated we were asked if we could do more on other topics of Christian Evidences. To that end, Mark and Jon put their heads together and came up with another series of fourteen lessons as a follow-up to the first – the three groups we presented the first series to this year have all asked for the second series next year. In addition, five other congregations have asked that we present the first series for them, with others also expressing interest.

We are excited to see people enthusiastic about learning about the evidences that are there for God and creation and also the flaws in the theory of evolution. Mark and I are planning to be at five locations during 2026 and are currently working out dates when these can take place. Contact us if you would like this series of lessons presented to your congregation as well and we will plan for it in future years.

In the meantime there are other good Bible

studies to be utilised. The next is the residential study week at Bassenfell Manor beginning on Monday, 3rd November – there are still space for a few if you would be interested in joining us.

We are planning other study weekends to take place during 2026 involving other teachers and other studies – contact us if we can be of help in your area.

EUROPEAN VISION WORKSHOP

Wroclaw, Poland, October 2025

At this year's event the Brits had the largest attendance, and everyone went back home encouraged. Wroclaw, an ancient city, was a pleasant place to visit and easy to get there by plane. We stayed in a nice hotel with very good food and within easy walking distance of our venue – we were able to enjoy history going back at least a thousand years. The whole purpose of the event was to have fellowship with Christians from Churches of Christ around the world.

We met Farshad and his wife from Iran who encouraged us by his work with the Farsi-speaking people. If you know of any using this language this would be a good contact to make

(<u>farshad.shirazee@gmail.com</u>). We also met Albert from Egypt who told us about being interrogated for three hours by Islamic police – all because he was helping people. Under Egyptian law Christians are not supposed to discuss their faith with Muslims.

From Ukraine Dmytro shared his work in various areas including dealing with crisis, taking food into

the country and dealing with refugees. He noted eight forms of love: 1. Mania – uncontrollable passion for oneself; 2. Ludos – which requires a one-sided benefit from others which can stop when help stops; 3. Pragma – grows with time for long time relationships; 4. Philautia – learning to accept and love oneself; 5. Eros – love for the external including all five senses; 6. Storge – encouraging that people should be understood, involves time for other people; 7. Phileo – connecting people together perhaps through interests; and 8. Agapa – Sacrifice for our mission, the highest unconditional and selfless love.

Family News

Stas Kuropiatnykov, also from Ukraine, enthusiastically shared gospel service with us, noting that we must rise to the occasion because we know that our Redeemer lives. Stas has visited the UK to try to encourage those who have moved here from Ukraine. Whilst at home he tried to help the thousands of refugees.

Annabelle Dawidow gave a fascinating talk about the history of Poland. Rob Hindman, working for Christ in Slovakia, encouraged us in our prayer and having the right mindset. Albert Cook, a missionary in Bucharest, Romania, encouraged the group with the programme known as 'Lads to Leaders'. This course for younger people helps to develop their potential to stand up and speak, to read publicly, to develop in just about every way with fun and purpose. It is obvious to many older people that our younger generation seem attached to their mobile phones and struggle to hold a conversation. The church needs to go beyond this thinking and help its youth to challenge themselves to be more than they think they can be. In a world of opportunities, Christians can help in ways that society cannot. Details of how to


develop this programme can be shared.

Raymond Glendinning

20th August 1953-27th September 2025

Raymond Glendinning, a 1981 graduate of the British Bible School, passed away recently in America.

Originally from Northern Ireland, Raymond and his wife Lorna were immersed into Christ in 1972. After graduating from the BBS he served the congregation in Skelmersdale for seven years until moving to America in 1989. There he worked with congregations in Texas, Kansas, Arkansas, Oklahoma, Mississippi and Missouri.

He suffered health conditions, particularly with his feet. Following retirement from full-time work he preached and taught classes often at churches within easy driving distance of Springfield, Missouri, while a member of the Sunset Church of Christ. With time health complications made driving difficult, and Lorna and then daughter Emma became his chauffeurs. Lorna passed away two years ago.

At Rest

John Tomey Aylesbury

September 1934-October 2025

John was born in September 1934 on Willow Road, Aylesbury, one of four siblings. His early years were shaped by the challenges of wartime Britain. With his father away for most of the war, John took on responsibilities from a young age, working on a local farm while the family lived at Broughton Crossing.

After the war, John continued farm work until he was called up for National Service, which he spent largely in Germany. A gospel campaign in Ireland, alongside Charlie Tweedie and Len Channing, led to a life-changing encounter with Norah, whom he later married in a chapel in Bierton, as the congregation then had no building of its own.

In the late 1950s, John and Norah became part of the Aylesbury congregation, where they remained faithful supporters throughout their lives. They raised two children, Ken and Helen, and John became a pillar of the church community. In the 1970s and 1980s, he worked closely with the youth, organising camps and weekend retreats, and later served as an elder, contributing in many ways until ill health limited his involvement.

In 1963, John left farm work to start his own gardening business, which he ran successfully until retiring in 1999. He and Norah enjoyed many happy years of retirement together until her passing in 2016.

In 2021, John moved into Hampden Hall Care Centre, where he was cared for with kindness and respect. His sense of humour and warmth



endeared him to the staff and fellow residents. Despite increasing frailty in 2025, John remained cheerful and passed away peacefully due to old age on Monday, 6th October, at the age of 91.

John was known for his warm personality, quick sense of humour and a distinctive Bucks accent, which remained with him throughout his life and was a cherished part of his identity. He had a beautiful singing voice and a deep love for hymns, which brought comfort and joy to many. His Sunday evening devotionals were a memorable time of quiet reflection and heartfelt worship. We shall greatly miss hearing him sing and pray during times of worship.

John's life was marked by service, love, and quiet strength. He will be deeply missed by all who knew him.

THE MILLSTONES ARE PILING

"In the first century AD, Jewish households commonly used millstones for grinding grain, a practice deeply embedded in daily life. The most primitive form was the saddle-quern, consisting of two stones: a large, heavy 'nether' stone made of hard lava or basalt from the Hauran region, which was hollowed slightly to resemble a saddle, and a smaller 'upper' or 'rider' stone that was rubbed back and forth over it by hand. This method was used for grinding grain, including manna, as mentioned in Numbers 11:8. These hand-mills were essential household tools, and their importance was such that taking a millstone as a pledge for a debt was prohibited, as it deprived a person of their means to prepare food.

"By the first century a more advanced form of mill, influenced by Greco-Roman technology, was introduced. This larger mill featured an upper millstone shaped like two hollow cones, which was turned by an ass, and is referred to in the New Testament as the 'great millstone'. This type of mill was used for larger-scale grinding and represented a significant advancement in milling technology." [from AI-generated historical information]

"Now he said to the disciples, It is inevitable: for offences not to come, but woe to him, through whom they come! It is beneficial for him if a millstone rotated by a donkey encompassed around his neck, and he has been tossed into the sea, rather than that he should offend one of these little ones" (Luke 17:1,2). Matthew gives a broader context in chapter eighteen, when Jesus used a child to illustrate the humbleness and trust those who believe in him should have.

The saddle-quern millstone was far too small for Jesus to use to illustrate his warning to anyone who causes such ones to stumble and the sea near the shore too shallow, so he mentions the deep sea.

While a child was used as an illustration, it does no disservice to Scripture to ponder on how actual children are being lead astray from God's order of creation and the establishment of family.

Because of their impressionability and lack of experience that comes from maturity, adults would shield children from seeing or hearing things that would cause them distress or confusion. In many places those days are gone! What young children are being taught in education establishments these days would cause many a teacher long dead to "turn in their grave." There seems to be a concerted effort, on the part of some who have gained authority, to destabilise society in what ever way gains popularity in some circles. Since adults, at least those whose knowledge and wisdom is well grounded, are able to see through many of the tactics used to influence changes in society, what better way to achieve success by influencing the next generation, too young to know the difference to challenge an agenda.

Be it child or adult, no matter who is involved in attempts to influence them; to wipe away God's influence over how humanity should live; the millstones are pilling up!

Total = £14,220





Parents will hear the cry as their children want this or that toy for Christmas, whilst grandparents consider how much should go into an envelope in place of a proper present. Then, after eating too much, we can enjoy the great noise of BIG BEN as another year is born into our calendar.

I rather like the Christmas malarky. The celebratory meals with friends and family, hearing from people that we have not seen for years but we find they are still with us. I love the Christmas carols and the telling of the old story that Jesus came to earth. God came to us and for us. I like it at our annual Toy Service when, instead of bread and wine, our communion table is covered with brand

new toys that Christians and friends bring to be redistributed to families in the area who are having a tough time. We do not know where they go but they go with our love and prayers.

But most of all, I love, once again, reading the prophecies of the coming of Jesus. Great chunks of our New Testament are quotes from the Old Testament. For hundreds of years God was planning to visit his creation and in the form of Jesus to live and to die for mankind. The plan was carefully made and set in motion to allow the foolishness of creation to be guided from generation to generation.

To see slowly, almost imperceptibly, the revealing of God himself, through love and mercy, to forgive and renew divine promises. The anxious Israelites were given manna in the wilderness. We read in Psalm 78:23-25, 'Yet he gave a command to the skies above and opened the doors of heaven; he rained down manna for the people to eat, he gave them the grain of heaven. *Men ate the bread of angels*; he sent them all the food they could eat.' The bread of angels was the great gift. I have only recently thought about this, that manna was the bread of angels.

You may be nearly there in your preparations for various festivities but let me ask you, are you ready to meet Jesus? Have you been through the waters of baptism? Do you celebrate each week in bread and wine at the Saviour's table? Are you making plans, for this year, for next year, to be bold in your love for Jesus, or are you waiting until the last minute? Are you nearly there?

Father God, you are always ready to receive us – thank you. Help us to be received by you. Amen.
