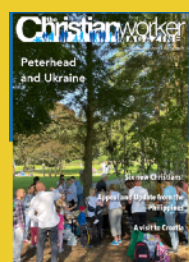

This photo was taken early on in our efforts to provide a “Hub” where Ukrainian refugees could find access to essentials such as: clothes, personal hygiene products, and food. Our “Hub” also provides a safe space for care and community.

When we first heard about the devastating events befalling many of the Ukrainian people we, like many, wanted to respond to the need and in some way bring relief to those who were being displaced.

After some planning and much prayer we decided on a number of ways we would begin to focus our efforts on serving the people of Ukraine. Initially we had a special offering that went to Trevor Williams to help with his efforts. We committed to prayer every Wednesday evening. We also began to search for ways to be more involved here in Peterhead.

The evidence of God's hand is all over this! We attended a local meeting where anyone interested could come and see where there were possibilities to get actively involved. We had decided that our church building was a great resource and we would look at offering our support in some form. It wasn't long before our paths crossed with Amanda, who had been busy setting up “Scotland Supporting Ukraine.” Since partnering with Amanda our efforts have grown from strength to strength. God has placed the right people at the right time!

We have now been learning and serving since April. There have been many friendships formed and the “Hub” has become an integral part of the Ukrainian community in Aberdeenshire. We have served a great many families going through the early stages of “survival” mode.

Over time the work of the church has enabled many to find a caring community that is eager to accept and to help. The local community have been amazing in generously supporting the Hub with items of clothing, toys and household things. The church has become a focal point for many services and charities seeking to partner in caring for our Ukrainian friends.

Over the past months we have witnessed the work of the Spirit uniting our church in purpose as well as connecting us with the local community of Peterhead. This has resulted in care and warmth being given to those finding themselves in a land not their own and relying completely on those receiving them for support and provision. The good news is that God's people are equipped for such a time as this. All for His glory and to display His loving kindness.

Report from Ukraine

The orphanages I used to work with are planning to start working in September. They are preparing to accept children whose parents have been killed in the war and there is no one to take care of them now.

The prerequisite for an orphanage to work is a bomb shelter. Our institutions have deep basements, but usually no one ever goes there and the place turns into a damp and terrible storeroom for unnecessary things. Of course, it's not possible to make major repairs in a short period of time in such a room... but it is possible to bring it to a better condition. During this month we have bought paint and painted the walls, bought and installed ventilation pipes, made an additional exit with stairs, bought a toilet bowl and a hand basin. Many improvements are still needed, such as a toilet room, but we are gradually helping the orphanage as much as we can.

The directors are also asking for prayers. Please pray for the children, the staff and for the orphans who are in need of a psychologist, because some of the children do not know that they have lost their parents. The staff of the orphanage does not know yet how these children will be accepted and how they will behave...but they ask us to pray for this situation.

Also, one orphanage 'Happy Home', where seven children with

disabilities live, started to prepare for the cold winter and were looking for finances to buy firewood to heat their rooms in the winter. As soon as we found out about their need we helped them with this.

In our country, people at home preserve fruits and vegetables for the winter. And those refugees with whom we have weekly Christian meetings have asked for help, to buy them sugar to make jam and compote (this is when you boil fruit or berries in sweet water). Now these people have sweet compote and jam for the winter. I hope to try this jam with them over a cup of tea in winter.

All these people have been helped thanks to your support and care. Each one of them has asked me to convey their gratitude to you. I also want to say thank you for supporting those in need. May God bless you abundantly! Amen!

BRITISH BIBLE SCHOOL NOTES

Croatian Family Camp

Although not actually a British Bible School event, both Mark Hill and I were recently involved in a Croatian Family Camp on an island in the Adriatic Sea, just off the coast of Croatia. For some it might well have been little more than a relaxing holiday, but despite the surroundings there was good teaching, most useful discussions and delightful company.

Most of the participants were from various parts of Croatia, and though some were there for the first time, many had been to the event for a number of years making it something of an annual reunion. Accommodation was fairly basic, but more than suitable for an event of this nature where pretty much everything took place outside.

The younger generations generally spoke good English, but my evening sessions needed to be interpreted, making them about twice as long as usual! We spoke about this world not being our home, and how that our identities transcend our human experiences.

Dalmatia

This part of Croatia is known as Dalmatia and also forms a part of the ancient Roman province of Illyricum. The whole area is, understandably, steeped in history, and plays a small, but not insignificant role in the biblical record.

Towards the end of Paul's second letter to Timothy, he writes of Titus having gone to Dalmatia. We have no idea what he was doing there. Was he revisiting places where communities of believers had already been established? Or was he reaching out to as of yet unreached places?

Nearing the end of his letter to the believers in Rome, as he gives a reason for writing to them, Paul writes of having fully presented the good news of Christ from Jerusalem all the way to Illyricum.

From Jerusalem to Illyricum...this was the geographic extent of Paul's mission activity. And though we know nothing in particular of what he did in these parts, we know that Christ was working through him to bring salvation to those lost in this life.

OUR SPIRITUAL HERITAGE

It is true to say that in the British Isles we have a great heritage that goes back thousands of years. Peoples such as the Celts, Romans, Vikings, Angles, Saxons and the Normans have made their mark. More recently people from the Commonwealth countries have moved here and enriched us as a nation.

So what about our spiritual heritage as churches of Christ in these islands? Recently I read the *Historical Survey of the churches of Christ in the British Isles* which was edited by our late, beloved brother Joe Nisbet. It made me appreciate the efforts made to restore faith and practice based purely on Biblical principles. One important aspect of their efforts was the publications they produced.

In the 19th century the “British Millennial Harbinger” was published by James Wallace from Nottingham. It was the counterpart of the “Millennial Harbinger” published by Alexander Campbell in the USA. James Wallace published articles written by Alexander Campbell and other brothers. There are copies of the “British Millennial Harbinger” in the British Bible School library (now housed in Northampton).

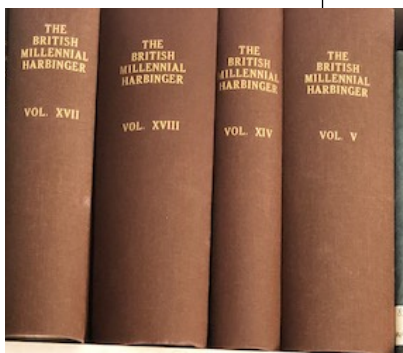
In the 20th century another publication came on the scene, the “Scripture Standard”. Walter Crosthwaite was its first editor and it began publication in 1935. The “Scripture Standard” was published as a response to the liberal, modernistic teaching from Overdale College, Birmingham. The “Scripture Standard” attempted to restore confidence in the Bible as the word of God and to place it at the heart of what is

believed and taught. Due to the nature of the publication, issues were debated in its pages. It also contains the names of congregations that sadly no longer exist. The publication has had several editors: Walter Crosthwaite, Carlton Melling, James R. Gardiner, Robert Marsden and Allan Ashurst. This year, in the March edition, it was announced that Allan Ashurst has stepped down from the editorship. You can have access to all the editions from its website, www.ScriptureStandard.eu.

Another publication of the 20th century was “Truth for Today”. It was published by Len Channing was also its first editor. I was introduced to it after I became a Christian in the 1970s. It contains articles covering many different subjects written by Albert Winstanley, Frank Worgan, Alf Marsden, H.B. Frank, Tony Coffey, John Griffiths, Philip Slate, Andrew Gardiner, Bob Eckman and many others. Len Channing edited it until his death in 1984 after which John Diggle Sr was appointed editor and he was in that role until his death. The final editor was our Ken Mullan. It ceased publication in the mid-1990s. However Graeme Morrison has a link to all of its editions on his website www.graemebibleresources.com.

Of course we must not forget the “Christian Worker” which was started by Albert Winstanley in 1969. I have always found it informative, not only because of the teaching in its pages but also because of the news from congregations in the British Isles and beyond. It makes a very important contribution to the church and long may it continue.

Yesterday, Filipino pupils returned to face-to-face classes for the first time since the pandemic. Amidst all these price increases (gasoline, electricity, food, etc), we have this added need for our youth and children as they return to school. For \$15 per child, we can help them buy a school bag and some school supplies such as notebooks, paper, pens. Will you give?

Our weekly food pantry continues to bless families in this neighbourhood. For \$5 per family per week, we provide them 5 kgs of rice which is a Filipino daily must-have. We are thankful to have the food pantry serving everyone these past seventeen months.

Thank you for your many prayers for those of us who endure all sorts of disasters in this life.

THE MINISTRY OF SISTERS

Last month I wrote about ‘The husband of one wife’ when I tried to begin a dialogue about the ministry of sisters in our fellowship. I have had some interesting comments and concerns. One sister wrote and told me that she feels she has not been equipped fully to teach and reach out to people; she has even been verbally abused from women at the school gates because she takes her children to church services. Another woman feels that our fellowship is misogynistic. Others feel that they would like to include sisters more but are afraid of what other churches would say or do.

Have we taken the ‘silence’ of women to the extreme? The question has been asked if it is appropriate for sisters to prepare communion and take it to the table, pass it from one to another in the pew and clear away after the meeting, why can’t they serve directly from the table to the pew? A recently immersed boy can do this but an older sister cannot.

It is interesting to realise that not only men followed Jesus but also women, even though this was not the normal custom in Israel. We find in Luke 8:1-3 that they not only travelled with Jesus but supported him financially. These same women were the ones who went to the tomb and saw the resurrected Jesus and went with the message of the resurrection to the apostles. Phoebe (Romans 16:1-2) is known as a servant literally translated a deaconess.

In ‘Memoir of David King’ (page 287) suggestions are made that “deaconesses should be ordained wherever practicable”. If one of the great leaders of our churches in the United Kingdom in the 1800’s suggested such and many of our churches did appoint deaconesses should we consider doing the same today? Did he or we get it wrong?

If our sisters are to fulfil Acts 2:17-18, what shall we do about it? *In the last days, God says, I will pour out my Spirit on all*

people. Your sons and daughters will prophecy, your young men will see visions, your old men dream dreams, Even on my servants, both men and women, I will pour out my Spirit in those days and they will prophecy.

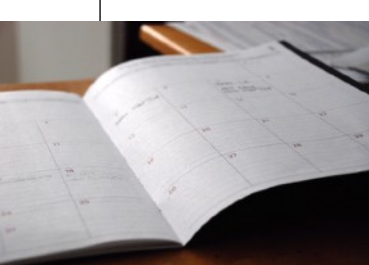

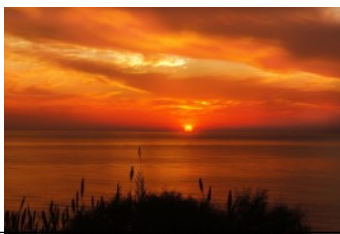
